

## Notes on the Classes and Teaching Method

There are two 2-hour classes (morning and afternoon) each day for 5 days.


Classes are well subscribed and it's limited to 25-30 students, but there are a range of abilities from absolute beginner to those more accomplished who bring their own kit. So, I have concentrated on relatively simple images that it is easy to demo but also ensure that there is the potential for the better artists to be engaged and challenged. Watercolour painting kits are available from Cunard.




My method is to have an A3 finished painting on an easel at the front. Introduce myself, then just go around with everyone giving their name and for each guest to state - beginner, intermediate or more experienced (so as I know where help will be required). Then gather everyone round a table to show a demo for 10-15 minutes. Everyone has a handout. Painting starts and I walk around helping and guiding. The last 10-15 minutes, we ask if any of the participants would be prepared to show their painting to the group. I will praise it and talk about the good points.

Notes: If there are participants who struggle with the drawing process at the start, I will provide an approach to help with this for these specific participants. There will also be brief pauses to look at the accomplished artists work and exemplify anything that is worth modelling.

Beginners are welcome as well as those with more experience.</p>
3	<p><b>Painting Foliage</b></p> <p>This class looks at simple ways to portray foliage. We look at trees, shrubs and grasses.</p>		<p>There will be a short demonstration showing how to approach painting foliage in watercolour. There are numerous ways that this can be achieved and here we look at a few options to consider.</p>
4	<p><b>Lemon Still Life</b></p> <p>This class explores a fruit painting, including reflections on the lemons, different tones from yellow to green and leaf detailing.</p>		<p>A short demonstration will be followed by the group looking at the colours and techniques to capture a lovely still life of lemons.</p>
5	<p><b>Doorway in Cordoba</b></p> <p>This class explores how look at a simple Moorish doorway and how we can capture the stonework and shadows which will bring it to life.</p>		<p>This demonstration looks at the technique of dry brushwork to pick up the variations in the stone surround and how the strong sunlight shows the depth of the opening.</p>

6	<p><b>Value Studies</b></p> <p>This class explores how to create four different value studies of a simple subject</p>		<p>There will be a short 10–15-minute demo showing the way values influence our area of attention or focus within the painting. Here are four ways to look at the same subject.</p>
7	<p><b>Great Watercolour Paintings</b></p> <p>What makes a great watercolour painting? This class explores four fundamental areas to consider when starting to paint</p>		<p>Great watercolour paintings-there are four main things to consider:  1 narrative 2 composition 3 values and focus then 4 colour register  We look at a great example and then there is a demo of a simpler image</p>
8	<p><b>Composition</b></p> <p>This class looks at the basis of good composition, showing example of Brooklyn Bridge and Cyprus Point</p>		<p>We look at a dramatic composition and then there is a demo of a simpler painting.</p>
9	<p><b>Complimentary Colours and Mixing Paint</b></p> <p>This class explores how to use complimentary colours, and mixing the right density of colour</p>		<p>Paint mixing and blending is a vital part of the process. Understanding how much water to add and when to use a strong mixture is key to producing something special. We will see a simple demo of complimentary colours being mixed.</p>
10	<p><b>Figure Painting</b></p> <p>This class looks at simple figure painting in watercolour. Two figures partly in silhouette in a dramatic setting</p>		<p>There will be a 15-minute video showing how to go about painting figures. Our masterclass will study a wonderful example of a painting by Thomas Schaller an American watercolourist.</p>

This class explores painting shadows with confidence</p>		<p data-bbox="1722 429 2384 608">Shadows are a vital part of any watercolour painting. There will be a short demonstration on how to go about painting a deep dark shadow including the colours to use and how to mix these.</p>

Many scenes include some element of water. It is important to make it look realistic and lively. Reflections should be treated in a convincing manner.</p>

These range from bright and cheerful to moody and dark.</p>		<p data-bbox="1722 886 2384 1065">Techniques for painting skies- one approach is demonstrated. Understanding how much water to add and when to use a strong mixture is key to producing something special. Colour choice is also important.</p>

We talk about the important aspects to emphasise, and potentially the things to leave out.</p>
